The **Horizon Award** recognizes creative and caring individuals who continually pursue new ideas that result in the development of innovative products designed to improve the quality of life for people who are blind and visually impaired.

The **Louis Award**, named after Louis Braille, recognizes the impact, creativity, efficacy of a product, idea, method, or promotional effort that increased the availability or awareness of braille and/or tactile graphics.

The **Navigator Award** recognizes the collaborative efforts and partnerships necessary to remove barriers and provide pathways ensuring that individuals have full access to education and life.



Keynote SpeakerDr. M. Leona Godin

Godin is a writer, performer, educator, and author of *There Plant Eyes: A Personal and Cultural History of Blindness* (Pantheon, 2Ø21). Her writing has appeared in *The New York Times, Playboy, O Magazine, Electric Literature, Catapult*, and other print and online publications. She produced two plays: *The Star of Happiness*, about Helen Keller's time performing in vaudeville, and *The Spectator and the Blind Man*, about the invention of braille. She wrote the script for *There Plant Eyes: A Personal and Cultural History of Blindness*, a forthcoming documentary about blind culture and community for the American Foundation for the Blind.

Godin holds a Ph.D. in English, in addition to her many years teaching literature and humanities courses at NYU, she has also lectured on art, accessibility, technology, and disabilities at places such as Tandon School of Engineering, Rice University, Baylor College of Medicine, and the American Printing House for the Blind.



The federal government provides substantial support for special education. Each year, Congress decides how much funding to allocate to support programs, including APH, the official U.S. supplier of accessible books, technologies, and educational materials for students who are blind or low vision. Each state receives a portion of the federal funding (known as the quota) to support eligible students.

emPOWERed by Big Data!

Recognizing the need for and power of data, VisionServe Alliance partnered with The Ohio State University College of Optometry to produce 5Ø state briefing papers and a national briefing paper about aging and vision loss. The national report and initial eight state reports have been released. These briefings demonstrate wide variability of the prevalence of vision impairment among older people from state to state.

Building an emPOWERed Future: Child Count and APH Census

This session will cover two topics related to the APH service of the Annual Census: (1) variations in states' definition & eligibility criteria for students with visual impairments and (2) sources of population data for students with visual impairments, with a proposal on how an accurate, inclusive population count could be created. Attendees may be interested in policy issues and state-level administration and have some foundational knowledge of the APH census and/or special education eligibility criteria for students with visual impairments.

Recent research (Schles et al., 2022) documented states' eligibility criteria in the IDEA category of "visual impairments including blindness," finding about 75% of states use different language or terminology than the federal definition. Interstate variations can involve differing assessment components or qualifying conditions (e.g., specifying students may have 20/70 acuity or less, a progressive condition, etc.). Parallel to eligibility criteria, information will be shared with attendees on the different sources of population data about students with visual impairments that are currently available, and the drawbacks of each. Attendees will be invited to join in a discussion on the impact partial population counts has to their own work, along with proposed solutions so that all students with visual impairments are included in future population counts.




